Internet Tax Freedom Act

- House Bill
 - Permanent extension
 - No grandfather
 - Telecommunications expansion
 - VoIP issue

ITFA - Cont.

- Senate Bill
 - 4-year extension
 - Telecommunications expansion
 - DSL, wireless, middle mile, backbone services
 - Dual grandfather clauses
 - VoIP clarification
- Likely outcome Senate version

Business Activity Tax

- Expansion of P.L. 86-272
- Physical presence + carve-outs standard
 - 21 days
 - Protected activities
- Independent and dependent contractor exclusion

BAT - Cont.

- Issues for states
 - Nexus standards in federal law
 - Incentives for planning/sheltering
 - Federalism issues
 - Revenue impacts

Remote Sales

- Authority to require remote sellers to collect
 - If Agreement is operational
 - If Member of the Agreement
 - If Agreement meets simplification standards in legislation
 - If seller is above "Small Business Exception" -effectively \$5 million

Remote Sales -- Cont.

- Issues for States
 - Vendor compensation
 - Telecommunications simplification
 - Federal court review
 - Workability
- State of Play
 - Review and discussion
 - Focus on workability
 - Addressing policy issues

Lessons Learned

- Increased efforts at preemption should be expected
 - 'New' industries/technologies
 - Globalization
 - Desire for "one set of rules"
- Lack of context
 - No partnership
 - No sense of intergovernmental fiscal system
 - Differential impacts of one set of rules

Lessons -- Cont.

- Lack of institutions
 - Committees of jurisdiction
 - Executive agencies
 - CBO, CRS
- Congress sees itself as referee or protector
 - Choose among 'friends'
 - Restrict states to pursue 'national priorities'
 - Trade-off issues

Lessons -- Cont.

- Federal action:
 - Creates winners/losers/preferred players
 - Breeds claims for 'equitable' treatment
 - Breeds 'bad' tax policy

What We Need

- Problem solving at home
- Best offense
 - Solid knowledge of state practices
 - State-assessed evaluation of impacts
 - Revenue impacts are essential
 - Contact with delegation if critical
- Need strategy for awareness and context
